## What was the last thing you were curious about?

How do you maintain curiosity with those you disagree with? Do you see value in this? How do you cultivate/maintain engagement?

# What is the function of listening in relation to curiosity?

How does one listen well? What specific attributes do you witness in others that listen well? What is your growing edge in listening? What is your success?

Remember that your answers are distinct. You possess specific skills and points of view. Your curious and generative actions come from your distinct context. These reflections came about after reading "I Never Thought of it That Way" by Mónica Guzmán, which I highly recommend and Mako's thoughts on silence.
